GOSPEL REFLECTION



Our Lord's ascension into Heaven, the climax and fulfilment of restoration of the human race to grace and glory, would not have been complete without Our Lady's assumption. For two reasons: firstly, because the woman Eve played such a key part in the fall from grace; it was of her that God said to the devil, "I will put enmity between you and the woman, between her offspring and yours". Therefore a woman, in this case Our Lady, plays a key role when her offspring, Jesus Christ, the fruit of her willing co-operation with God, defeats the power of the devil. Secondly, the human race, though created as two, is

in fact one; when Eve is created Adam says, "at last ... bone of my bone and flesh of my flesh!" This oneness in variety was confirmed, strengthened, raised to a new level, by Christ. He prays to the Father, "that they may be one as we are one." Where the devil had ruptured and destroyed, Jesus, supported by Our Lady, restores and re-makes. Our Lady's assumption is the outward, visible sign of the restoration of oneness; indeed of the new creation.

Others alas have such butterfly minds that when they try to fix their thoughts on God they are assailed by a thousand foolish ideas; their thoughts run hither and thither and it is impossible to control them (or so it seems). People can either be born this way or become so in the course of their life. Prayer for them is a continual struggle. If you are like these people then the advice I give is that on no account should you give up. Every journey begins with a single step - take it. One step will take you nearer to God, and even if you do not progress further at least you have made a good start and cannot possibly come to harm.

St Martha was holy but from the Gospels it doesn't seem that she would count as a 'contemplative' in the usual sense of that word. But she was certainly a dear friend of

Jesus and was chosen to serve him faithfully and lovingly. So if your way to God is through service why complain? Someone has to cook the meals! We can't all sit around like Mary. Society needs all sorts to keep going. Contemplation, mental prayer, tending the sick, preparing the food . . . Everything combines to greet the Guest who comes to us in one way or another. Don't be choosy about your tasks. Do what is necessary and what seems to be your personal calling without comparing yourself with others or fussing about the degree of 'contemplation' you have or have not reached. That is a waste of time!

Those God calls to the highest reaches of prayer are always courageous in undergoing suffering and are humble enough to accept whatever God chooses to give them.
