GOSPEL REFLECTION



The Gospels are filled with examples of people who are public sinners and 'undesirables' being in the company of Jesus. Time and again his anger is directed at the so-called good people, the respectable members of society, the Scribes and the Pharisees. Jesus sees through their pride and hypocrisy and warns them that, unless they change, the doors of the Kingdom will be closed to them. It is all too easy to make judgments of others, especially those whose 'sins' and failures are paraded in public by the media. But Jesus is interested in appearances of respectability. He goes beyond the external aspects and sees into the heart and soul of each person he meets. Pride is at the root of every sin, especially pride that we are better than others. Those whose

weaknesses have been publicly revealed cannot pretend that they are better than others. Their humiliation makes them suffer, but it is much easier for them to recognise exactly who they are in front of God. If we fail to recognise that nothingness, we will never build a true relationship with God.

250. An attitude of openness in truth and in love must characterize the dialogue with the followers of non-Christian religions, ... St Teresa's Way of Perfection* IF YOU ARE SUFFERING



If you are suffering look on Jesus as he goes to Gethsemane, or bound to the column of scourging, spat upon, denied by his friends, cold and alone. Offer him comfort.

Or look upon Jesus bent double under the weight of the cross. Allow him to gaze at you then with his eyes full of compassionate tears as you bear him company. You will then realise the value of suffering and the reality of the pain that the Lord bore for you, which is so much greater than anything you will be asked to bear for him.

Or try putting yourself in the place of Mary Magdalen or the Blessed Virgin. Let them guide your thoughts as you strive to be present on Calvary. Another help is to find a picture of Jesus that appeals to you and look at it regularly when you are at prayer. This will make the Lord more real to you. And don't say that all this is too complicated and difficult. You aren't short of words to talk to people around you, so there's no reason to run out of things to say when you talk to God and know he is present with you. Just keep at the side of the Master, Jesus, and resolve to learn all he wants to teach you. He will never leave you unless you leave him first. Consider his words, his deeds, and be convinced of his love. Use your imagination – your heart as well as your head.

I am looking forward to an outing co-ordinated by the Children's Liturgy at St George's, I have very much benefited by and enjoyed outings with them in the past.


Deacon John Writes:

The readings last weekend were all about forgiveness. I think we all know how difficult it can be to forgive. I hope these two stories will help and encourage you to forgive others for what they have done and also to forgive ourselves for doing something we know to be wrong, for forgiveness brings with it peace of mind.

Sheila Cassidy, who was tortured by Pinochet's men in South America,

wrote: I can only say: however much we have been wronged, however justified our hatred, if we cherish it, it will poison us. Hatred is a devil to be cast out, and we must pray for power to forgive, for it is in forgiving our enemies that we are healed.

In 1965 Richard Dimbleby visited Belsen where notices in different languages asked you to respect the dead who were buried there, about 70,000 of them. He came across a large wooden cross with wreaths beneath it. Below it was a prayer written on a scrap of paper by a woman prisoner. She had written it for those who were tormenting her. This is the prayer: Lord, remember not only the men and women of good will, but also those of ill will. But do not only remember all the suffering they have inflicted on us. Remember the fruits we bought, thanks to this suffering. Our comradeship, our loyalty, our humility, our courage, our generosity, the greatness of heart which has grown out of all this. And when they come to judgement let all the fruits that we have borne be their forgiveness.
