

Our Faith on Sunday

GOSPEL REFLECTION



The disciples were terrified: the boat was almost swamped and the storm raged. We have here, surely, a parable of our own time, the Covid scourge. It raged throughout the world, in some parts more than others; it produced new, threatening

varieties; it challenged medical skill and care. Many of us were terrified, afraid; many mourned. The disciples wake Jesus and he calms the storm. Then he rebukes them gently, "Why were you afraid?" could you not have had faith that, even though I was asleep, all would be well? Or is he saying, You were right to call on me for help, but why with fear? Where is your faith in my care for you and my power to save? Do not be afraid; the universe is in my hands - the elements, life and death - and I love you. "Do not be afraid; only have faith," he says to Jairus, when the officials report that Jairus' daughter, has died. "Do not be

afraid", and he restores the child to life. The fact that Jesus was asleep in the boat, is significant. God can seem asleep! He tells us that he waits for faith. In Nazareth he "could work no miracles.... he was amazed at their lack of faith." On other occasions he praises faith: having cured the blind man at Jericho, he says to him, "Go, your faith has saved you."

33. The world was relentlessly moving towards an economy that, thanks to technological progress, sought to reduce "human costs"; there were those who would have had us believe that freedom of the market was sufficient to keep everything secure. Yet the brutal and unforeseen blow of this uncontrolled pandemic forced us to recover our concern for human beings, for everyone, rather than for the benefit of a few. Today we can recognize that "we fed ourselves on dreams of splendour and grandeur, and ended up consuming distraction, insularity and solitude. We gorged ourselves on networking, and lost the taste of fraternity. We looked for quick and safe results, only to find ourselves overwhelmed by impatience and anxiety. Prisoners of a virtual reality, we lost the taste and flavour of the truly real".[32] The pain, uncertainty and fear, and the realization of our own limitations, brought on by the pandemic have only made it all the more urgent that we rethink our styles of life, our relationships, the organization of our societies and, above all, the meaning of our existence.

St Teresa's Way of Perfection* CHRIST AWAKE IN YOU

'I would haste to find myself a shelter from the raging wind and tempest.' At times, there is the sea and the storm, and there is nothing you can do but cry out: 'Lord, I perish'. Then let him who steps without fear upon the waves stretch out his hand. Let him remove your anxiety and confirm his strength in you. Let him speak to you within and say to you: 'Turn your mind to me, and to what I have suffered.' Perhaps it is an evil brother who is causing you grief, or a hostile stranger; but which of these have I not suffered?'

Though the storm rages, he saves us from weakness of mind and from the storm. Perhaps your ship is tossed about because he is asleep within it. While the sea raged, and the boat in which the disciples sailed was tossed about, Christ slept. Then finally they saw that among them was sleeping the ruler and creator of the winds, and so they approached Christ and roused him. He commanded the winds, and all became still. And so it is perhaps with good reason that your heart is disturbed, because you have forgotten him in whom you believe. You suffer beyond your endurance because you do not remember what Christ has done for you. And if you are not mindful of Christ, then he sleeps. Arouse Christ and awake your faith. For Christ slumbers in you if you do not recall his sufferings; but if you are

For when, with a whole heart, you have considered his sufferings, will you not then calmly endure what you suffer, even perhaps rejoicing that through your sufferings you bear a certain likeness to your King? So when you have begun to be comforted and to rejoice through thinking upon these things, he has then arisen, he has commanded the winds, and therefore there shall be a great calm. 'I would haste to find myself a shelter from the raging wind and tempest.'

Fr Rory Writes:

I have just noticed the beautiful flowers while sitting in the church saying my prayers. All of a sudden it came to my attention how lovely the flowers are, and then I remembered that I was told that they were all from our garden. Thank you Lulu. I have often noticed the flowers with St George's Church, where over the years they have done a wonderful job on the flowers. Unfortunately the sadness is that the church has to be locked because it is so isolated and as such a vulnerable place.

I went to sit in the church to reflect upon our situation in light of the government statements this evening on the current situation concerning the virus. Our hopes of returning to normal life are as important as ever and coming to terms with the effect that lockdown had on us and also on me as parish priest has been severe. The implications of visiting someone with such age and health issues is always on my mind. Christmas time was particularly difficult, especially in the end when it was not possible to celebrate our Masses. Please God, we can eventually put all this to rest.

Now we need to restore and please God, develop the life of our parish for our future. We will have a parish finance meeting this Wednesday, just for an initial reflection and establishing priorities and preparing ourselves ready to be fit for purpose for our future. We will be able to address this in the weeks to come.

Our celebration of the Sacrament of Reconciliation last Saturday was a big step in the right direction. I was especially pleased because of the parents that joined their children to receive the sacrament. It became noticeable years ago to me that most parents sent their children to confession, but did not give the example of doing so themselves. Then it was equally clear that parents were beginning to want to have their children baptised in order to get into our Catholic schools, but seldom or ever would go themselves to church. As the years have rolled on the gap between our catholic schools and their parish gets wider, and catholic teachers have become extremely scarce.

Deacon John Writes:

Many of us will have been on a boat during a storm. It is often not a comfortable experience! The gospel this Sunday is the familiar one where Jesus actually sleeps while the storm is raging around their boat. The apostles get rather panicky and wake Jesus who in effect says 'what is the problem you men of little faith' and promptly gets the waves and wind to calm down. In times of trouble and distress we should always remember that Jesus is in the boat with us and that, with faith, all will be well eventually.

Last Thursday the gospel of Matthew introduced the Lord's Prayer - the

Prayer for 'forgiveness'. He includes an instruction about 'babbling' on with lots of words. The. Instruction is saying 'don't do it! Use only necessary words = be short and concise. True forgiveness makes a huge difference to us and if there was more of it the world would surely be a better place!

On Saturday Matthew wrote about anxiety and worry - "why are you anxious about clothes?" Has any one of us never had thoughts which worry us? Worry about the time, have we got enough bread in, enough milk and others, many more serious to us. Whatever the problem, "trust in God" is the answer. Accept that God loves us and he will take care of our worries - so let us all accept God's love - he will care for us and is the perfect antidote for any worry or anxiety that is holding us back from leading a full life - He will change everything.

There is a story told about a visitor to the Vatican who was quite impressed with the beauty and power of the place. He asked Pope John XXIII this question: "How many people do you have working here?" With a twinkle in his eye, the pope replied, "About half of them." Humour is one antidote for worry - it really can make you forget about your worries.

A small farming village was threatened with drought because the rains had failed to arrive. On a hot and dry Sunday, the priest told his congregation, "There isn't anything that will save us except to pray for rain. Go home, pray, believe, and come back next Sunday ready to thank God for sending rain." The people returned to church the following Sunday. As they sat down the Pastor gently rebuked them. "We can't worship today because you do not yet believe," he said. "But we prayed" they protested, "and we do believe." "Believe?" he responded. "Then where are your umbrellas?"
