The disciples were astounded by these words, but Jesus insisted, 'My children,' he said to them, 'how hard it is to enter the kingdom of God! It is easier for a camel to pass through the eye of a needle than for a rich man to enter the kingdom of God.' They were more astonished than ever. 'In that case,' they said to one another, 'who can be saved?' Jesus gazed at them. 'For men,' he said, 'it is impossible, but not for God: because everything is possible for God.

Peter took this up. 'What about us?' he asked him. 'We have left everything and followed you,' Jesus said, 'I tell you solemnly, there is no one who has left house, brothers, sisters, father, children or land for my sake and for the sake of the gospel who will not be repaid a hundred times over, houses, brothers, sisters, mothers, children and land - not without persecutions - now in this present time and, in the world to come, eternal life.'

GOSPEL REFLECTION



"Good Master," says the young man, "What must I do to inherit eternal life?" He has understood God's loving purpose for us all: eternal life. Life, we could say, with a capital L, for we know that that life will be a share in God's own life of happiness and glory. For this present life, God

has given us a plan of action, which he reiterates for the young man; a challenging plan of action, which the young man has so far followed. Now Jesus raises the challenge, linking it strongly to himself. He has and actions, that he has the right to make this new challenge and the power to enable its fulfilment. This the Apostles and disciples have relied on, in following Jesus. The young man found the challenge too great; but since that time, many men and women, have received that same invitation, to "leave house, brothers, sisters, father children or land" and

follow Jesus. Some have followed the disciples' example and have accepted the challenge. They have "left all to follow" Jesus: in the priesthood, in the religious life. Their fear of "persecution" has been overcome by already made it clear, by his words their trust in Our Lord's promise of repayment "a hundred times over ... now in this present time", and, finally, "eternal life".



EVANGELII GAUDIUM (JOY OF THE GOSPEL)

INFORMATION WITHOUT WISDOM

49. As silence and careful listening disappear, replaced by a frenzy of texting, this basic structure of sage human communication is at risk. A new lifestyle is emerging, where we create only what we want and exclude all that we cannot control or know instantly and superficially. This process, by its intrinsic logic, blocks the kind of serene reflection that could lead us to a shared wisdom.



It is only the life to come which makes us true Christians. No one should think that worldly happiness or good things in this life will result from being a Christian. They should rather use their present good fortune while it lasts in whatever way and to whatever extent they can. When they have good fortune, they should give thanks for God's compassion. When it is absent, they should give thanks for his righteousness. In all circumstances they should be grateful to their Father when he consoles and comforts them, but also when he corrects and punishes them. For God always loves us whether he consoles or reproves us, and we should repeat what we hear in this psalm: 'It is good to give thanks to the Lord, and sing praises to your name, O Most High'.

Deacon John Writes:

The Scripture readings we have heard recently offer us an invitation to become instruments of healing in Jesus' hands by giving voice to the voiceless, the needy, and the marginalised in our society. We have been invited to open our ears to hear the word of God and to allow the Holy Spirit to loosen our tongues to spread the Good News of God's love and salvation to others. God especially cares for "the frightened, the blind, the deaf, the lame, the mute," and He encourages the powerless to "be strong and fearless." Psalm 146 sings of a God who gives sight to the blind, raises up those who are bowed down and welcomes strangers. The Psalmist thanks God and asks us to rejoice because "the God of Jacob keeps Faith forever," keeping His promise of peace and fullness of life for His people. In recent readings we have been given some basic, challenging principles of social justice. He exhorts Christians to show no partiality based on external appearance and to practice God's "preferential option for the poor." He warns the faithful against scorning or shaming the poor while showing special consideration to the rich. Recently the Sunday Gospel described how Jesus, by healing a deaf man with a speech impediment, "The eyes of the blind shall be opened and the ears of the deaf unstopped." In another recent reading Isaiah listed conditions which are symbolic of our interior illnesses: blindness to the needs of our neighbour, unwillingness to hear God's voice and the inability to speak words of praise, apology, forgiveness, and gratitude.

Through the readings we hear at Mass we are constantly reminded that no one can be a follower of Jesus without reaching out to the helpless.
