Our Faith on Sunday

GOSPEL REFLECTION



The first thing that strikes us in this reading is that it is a woman, Mary of Magdala, who is the first to arrive at the tomb. She then runs to Peter and John to tell that the Lord has been taken from the tomb. The key phrase in this Gospel is that the

other disciple (John) went in and "he saw and he believed". Finally, the penny has dropped. Despite Jesus having told them on various occasions that he would rise up on the third day, they only believed it when they came to the tomb and

found him gone. We, of course, have the advantage of being able to read about the Resurrection of Jesus in the Gospels, but even so, we need to keep reminding ourselves, particularly when we are overwhelmed by suffering, that the suffering is only a prelude, a preparation for resurrection. This happens when we are able to embrace suffering as a face of the Jesus on the cross and we then receive the light of the risen Jesus. Let us thank God for letting us participate in a divine adventure.

It needs to be empha-sized that "biological sex and the socio-cultural role of sex (gender) can be distinguished but not separated".46 On the other hand, "the techno-logical revolution in the field of human procrea-tion has introduced the ability to manipulate the reproductive act, making it independent of the sexual relationship between a man and a wom-an. In this way, human life and parenthood have become modular and separable realities, subject mainly to the wishes of individuals or couples".47 It is one thing to be understanding of human weakness and the complexities of life, and an-other to accept ideologies that attempt to sun-der what are inseparable aspects of reality. Let us not fall into the sin of trying to replace the Creator. We are creatures, and not omnipotent. Creation is prior to us and must be received as a gift. At the same time, we are called to protect our humanity, and this means, in the first place, accepting it and respecting it as it was created.
